Terrorists:


Fulanis are the shepherds of Africa. Just as Moses took days leading his sheep all the way from Midian to Mt. They seldom are able to stop to get their children into schools, so not only are they very poor, they are also illiterate. And because of these things, many are desperate and angry enough to turn to the terrorists who are recruiting among them. There are almost no Christians among them.



So what can we do? Dr. Moussa understands the hearts of these people.

In fact, he even has a bit of Fulani ancestry in him! He has planted five churches among the areas that the terrorists have taken over.
